SEL Arts & Movement

Drawing as a Foundational Skill

Drawing is often primarily presented as a recreational activity, although it has played, and continues to play, a critical role in so many human endeavors. Why not consider the basics of drawing as important as math, science, reading and writing? Professions as varied as engineering, architecture, design, animation, etc., all rely on some form of drawing in visualizing and developing new products and ideas. In our presentation we hope to help expand the definition and purpose of drawing through various exercises that can easily and inexpensively be incorporated into the classroom. - *Rodrigo Avila, Hipbone Art Studio*

• Underglaze Mixing: Making your own underglaze at a fraction of the cost In my ceramics class, students love the bold and vibrant colors achieved using underglaze. The cost of premixed underglaze is prohibitive. In this workshop we will mix a base underglaze to take back to your classroom. We will also learn how to measure Mason stains into a container of base to achieve the proper color intensity. - Andrew Butterfield, Ida B. Wells



How is AP Studio Art going? Let's talk about it!

Please join me for an interactive workshop designed to support AP Studio Art teachers at all levels of experience. As the AP Studio Art curriculum has evolved over the past five years, it presents both new challenges and opportunities for educators and students alike. This workshop aims to provide a collaborative space where teachers can share insights, explore best practices, and gain a deeper understanding of the current AP Studio Art course and assessment methods. - Raychell Rohrwasser, Sherwood High School



Interactive STEAM art with Makey Makey

Makey Makey is a circuit-based kit that enables students to take art projects to the next level using STEAM. These hands-on lessons will enable your students to practice combining a Makey Makey circuit board with conductive materials, such as play doh, lemons, graphite and aluminum foil. In this session, we will create dough bongos, work as a group to make a circuit, and build works of art that are interactive. - *Megan Dee, Fremont Middle School*

Ceramic Survival Creatures

This workshop is based on a project where students will identify their own survival skills, characteristics or traits that help build resilience in the world around them as a teenager. These skills and character qualities may be identified as metaphors, adaptations, creature features, and items they carry, which all make up the student's personal survival creature. In order to make the creature come to life, the student will learn basic hand building skills: pinch pots, coil, slab and molding techniques. In addition to building basic ceramic knowledge and gaining hands on experience with hand building techniques, we will discuss possible studio management systems. - *Karen Rose, Realms High School*

Creativity in Action: Practice + Research

This session offers participants a model for teaching purposeful creative practice and interdisciplinary scholarly research. We'll share the journeys of PSU first-year students in year-long classes who worked with an artist-in-residence throughout the academic year. The collaboration began with creativity and play, leading students to develop habits, and ultimately to discover their own voices through creative practice and scholarly research. Students were introduced to creative and artistic research, then designed their own prompts, and developed individual creative practices over four weeks. The integration of scholarly research deepened their curiosity and encouraged interdisciplinarity. The project culminated with a public showcase which included a public exhibition, student-curated public experiences, and individual student presentations as part of PSU's Research Week.—Sarah Wolf Newlands, Portland State University





How Do Ideas Shape Art?

This experiential workshop is based on *Ideation*, a first year CORE art course at PSU designed to introduce creative research, idea generation, fruitful exploration, acts of noticing, and methods for developing ideas and communicating what has been discovered. • Decree Creation: Reimagining the Present and Future Through Poetry

This workshop is designed to help participants craft powerful proclamations of their identity and purpose through poetic expression. Using an excerpt from Ms. Hampton's film, "Petals and Thorns: A Spoken Word Journey," as inspiration, participants will engage in discussions and creative writing exercises to declare their existence, significance and the impact they want to have in their various communities with artistic flair. Shannon Johnson is an Arts Education Specialist with the Oregon Department of Education, where they support arts education efforts across the state. With a background in visual arts education and a deep passion for fostering creative learning environments, Shannon collaborates with educators, schools, and community organizations to enhance and expand arts programming for students across Oregon.

Afternoon 3 hr Workshops:



The Sometimes Messy Middle of Teaching Artistic Behavior and Studio Thinking

Letting our students learn through discovery takes scaffolding, planning and intention. Diane Jaquith, co-author of *Studio Thinking from the Start* will start our session with an in person interview on her curriculum, Teaching Artistic Behavior. Participants work through sample lesson plans, classroom room design possibilities and discover teaching in this framework leads to motivated empowered students (and teachers). If time allows we will also follow a simple lesson together to practice implementation. - *Julie Jeanseau*, *Queen of Peace Catholic School and Diane Jaquith*, *Codesigner of TAB*

• Bojagi Scrap Fabric Panel: Machine Sewing Techniques

Learn how to make your own bojagi-traditional Korean wrapping cloths-in this hands-on textiles workshop. Participants will learn how to create a double sided bojagi sample using colorful fabrics, and flat felled seams. This intermediate machine sewing workshop will cover history, tools and materials, as well as the techniques necessary to create a beautiful new textile from fabric scraps. All tools and materials-including sewing machines will be provided. Sewists of all skill levels are welcome, machine basics for teaching students to sew will be covered in this workshop, but general comfort using a sewing machine is preferred. - *Addy Kessler, Lincoln High School*

Origins and Exploration of Collage

The evolution of collage in Art History will be shared and explored. Participants will be guided through three projects that incorporate collage in the classroom using visual storytelling experimentation that breaks free from traditional artistic constraints. There will be an emphasis on using recycled materials. There will be a print taken from one or more of the compositions as a finished work of art. - Beth I Robinson, Jordan Schnitzer Museum of Art, University of Oregon and Ann Hamilton, Maude Kerns

Color Literacy: A New International Framework for Teaching Color

Learning about color is FUN! Participants in this workshop will get the chance to experience a selection of the hands-on, beta-test exercises from the international Colour Literacy Project's 'Eye Opener' Series. This first series of exercises is an introduction to color perception, the human visual system, and naming, describing and ordering color in three dimensions.

*The Colour Literacy Project is a joint initiative of the Inter-Society Color Council of the United States (ISCC) and the International Color Association (AIC) - Maggie Maggio is the current president of the Inter-Society Color Council of the US and co-chair of the Joint ISCC/AIC Colour Literacy Project.



• The Figure in Water

This painting workshop focuses on merging meaning with making. Participants will practice experimenting and taking risks with water media materials and techniques, gaining inspiration from "muse" artists, and creating meaningful work using personal source material. Participants will be led through an inspirational slideshow of the muse artsists' work and will be guided through a dynamic portraiture exercise. All materials included but be sure to bring photo sources you would like to work from. - *Tia Factor*, *Wilsonville High School*

Art Games to Boost Creativity

This hands-on workshop will teach a variety of art games that can be used as one-off activities, brainstorm development, or projects in themselves. 
